

When to Use

Use this page to create a site map of your complete web site, or any section of your site.

Examples of How to Use

- ▶ For smaller sites, create a site map for your entire web site.
- ▶ For larger sites, create a site map for all the sub-sections of your web site.

Site Map Page Sections & Fields

Page Section	Field Name/Item	Description of usage
Site Map Properties	Title Format	<p>This refers to how the title of each page included on the site map is displayed. These titles are displayed as links on the published Site Map page.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Select Page Title to display the Title field, e.g.: "Site Map" • Select URL Title to display the URL Title field, e.g.: "sitemap" (if no URL Title is entered in the field, <<Untitled>> will display on the site map. • Select Location Line to display the full Location Line path of each published page. This will display in the same format as the Location Line on your pages, e.g.: > Active Content Manager Support Center > Site Map • Select Published HTML Filename to display the full path of each published page. This will display in the same format as the Address to the page, e.g.: \sitemap.htm • Select Published Index Filename to display the full path of each published page's index file, e.g. \sitemap\index.htm
	Show only pages below this page	If you select this option, only the child pages created on the site map page are displayed on the published site map.
Site Map Sections	Top Level Pages	The pages listed here are all of the top-level pages you have created on the site.
	Max-Level of Sub-pages in Site Map	For each top-level page on your site, select the number of levels of sub-pages you want to display in the site map.

<i>Page Section</i>	<i>Field Name/Item</i>	<i>Description of usage</i>
Introduction Text	n/a	The text, graphics and links you enter here are displayed above the body of the Site Map, before any of the site links are displayed.
Conclusion Text	n/a	The text, graphics and links you enter here are displayed below the body of the Site Map, after the list of site links.

Site Map Page Tips!

- ▶ If your Site Map page is created at the top-most level of your website hierarchy, be sure to select **Do Not Show** in Site Map from the Max-Level of Subpages in Site Map drop-down.
- ▶ The Site Map page is a great Administrative tool when launching a new site. By utilizing the different Title views available for the Site Map, a Site Administrator can review the site for title formatting, file naming consistency, and URL lengths.
